Message from the Controller General

It is with great pride and pleasure that a message is issued as the Controller General of the Department on this occasion of issuing the performance report of the year 2023 of the Department of Imports and Exports Control which is established by the Import and Export Control Act, No. 1 of 1969, prevail under the Ministry of Finance, Economic Stabilization and National Policies.



In the year 2023, the operations of the department were started by preparing and introducing a new vision to lead the department through the “mission” of regulate the import and export procedure for a sustainably developed country taking into consideration the security, economy, public health, environmental conservation etc., in accordance with the Import and Export Control Act.

In the execution of the role directed as mentioned above, 14 Extraordinary Gazettes have been issued as the case may be, on the approval of the Honorable Minister of Finance, Economic Stabilization and National Policies, under the instructions and supervision of the Secretary to the Ministry.

In the face of economic crisis, this department had to work quickly in the first quarters of the year 2023, for the formulation of regulations under the Import and Export Control Act, in relation to the restrict or control or suspend or prohibit certain imports in accordance with a reasonable measure of consumption in the country in respect of the quality and quantity of such imported goods, particularly finished goods and consumer goods, since the Sri Lankan economy is based on a commercial background that is mainly import oriented.

In the last quarter of 2023, the said import restrictions were gradually eased in consultation with the Central Bank of Sri Lanka, Ministry of Finance, Economic Stabilization and National Policies and Department of Trade and Investment Policy, allowing the production of intermediate goods and also keeping in mind the intention of providing facilities to the industrialists and entrepreneurs of this country, based on the favorable outlook of the domestic economy due to import restrictions while considering the needs of the business community in Sri Lanka. Accordingly, by the end of the year 2023, easing the restrictions of temporary suspension on import through issuing Gazettes in 03 stages became positive tasks regarding import and export controls.

Furthermore, contributing to the regulate the existing payment terms with the guidance of the subject institutions and by analysing the negative effects caused to the economic operating system of this country through the payment terms used by importers, which are a very important sector in international trade, in a balanced manner, is an occasional important step taken by the department to secure the citizens of this country in the economic framework in all aspects.

Special attention was paid to the development of human and physical resources of the department, through organization of subject-specific training programs for officers at all levels of the department, as well as the expansion of the office space and the new establishment of appropriate locations for several divisions and units, in order to work effectively and sensitively to scope of the department. At the same time, it is another extension of the performance of the department's achievements, establishing service counters unique to the subjects of relevant units and deploying officers separately for those counters, for the convenience of the clients who come to the department.

Efforts were made to update the existing online computer system of the Department, blending with modern technology, in order to maintain the Department in a stable and orderly manner by

advancing its vision and mission through identified Sustainable Development Goals and to achieve the task of blending with the technological systems of the developed countries of the world, through it. Accordingly, it is a notable achievement in 2023 that the department received an online computer system for issuing import and export licenses prepared by the state of Estonia with the help of the American government. I would like to mention that the planned steps were already successfully completed in accordance with the relevant time frame.

Many work steps were planned and time frames were prepared together with the department staff for further improvement of the department process, in order to make the role of this department more efficient in the future,

On the whole, I would like to recall with gratitude the contribution made by the entire staff, including the executive officers, who have paved the way to gradually reach the department's vision by achieving the expected performance targets in the year 2023.

Moreover, the guidance provided by the Ministry of Finance, Economic Stabilization and National Policies during this challenging period is also noteworthy. Also, I gratefully mention here the support of the Central Bank of Sri Lanka, Department of Sri Lanka Customs and the commercial banking system of Sri Lanka, which are directly related to the work of this department, and other Ministries, Departments, Institutions, State Corporations and Statutory Boards, which are provided recommendations on issuing Licenses.

Within the legal framework covered by the Import and Export Control Act, No. 1 of 1969, all of us in the department have decided to commit ourselves to provide a more efficient and effective service by leading the Department of Import and Export Control to meet the expectations of the clients who are the majority of the private sector while adhering to the government's economic policies.

Chapter 1 – Department Profile / Summary of Implementation

1.1 Introduction

Safe and standardized imports and exports, with a long history dating back to the reign of King Udaya IV in the 10th century, have evolved into a more systematic and international trade facilitation role to date through the Department of Import and Export Control, which is established based on the Imports and Exports Control Act, No. 1 of 1969.

Accordingly, most of the basic import restrictions imposed in the face of the economic crisis have now been lifted by this Department which played a special role, going beyond the traditional role as the case may be, through the control of import restrictions and payment methods in accordance with the powers of the said Act, integrating with the comments, suggestions, investigations and advice of the Ministry of Finance, Economic Stabilization and National Policy, the Central Bank of Sri Lanka and other relevant parties paying attention to the positive trend of the crisis situation. Additionally, this Department could issue a large number of Extraordinary Gazettes in the year 2023.

Concerning national security, environmental conservation, good health and economic security, this Department takes every possible step to fulfil the procedure for issuance of import and export control licenses in a more effective and efficient manner to the satisfaction of the clients for the quantity and quality of the import and export products. There, relevant import controls are carried out in accordance with Basel, Montreal and other international conventions related to the environment. Furthermore, regulations related to public health protection were imposed by determining the standards of the goods during the importation of such goods. Accordingly, Sri Lanka standards have been mandated for 123 imported goods. In addition, measures were taken to prepare new rules in line with United Nations' 1540 Resolution, considering national security.

The basic foundation for introducing a new online system for issuance and debiting of licenses and other activities in the year 2024, was laid in this year. We hope that this will enable us to provide a more efficient and effective service to the public.

1.2 Departmental Vision, Mission, and Objectives

1.2.1 Vision

Regulation of Imports and Exports towards a Sustainably Developed Country.

1.2.2 Mission

Implementation of policy decisions taken from time to time by the Government regarding the security of the country, economy, public health, environmental protection, imports and exports control of goods, in accordance with the Imports and Exports Control Act No.1 of 1969.

1.2.3 Objectives

To regulate imports and exports in line with the policy decisions taken by the Government from time to time to ensure the security of the country, uplift the economy and protect public health and the environment.

1.3 Responsibilities and Tasks of the Department

- i. Issuing Extraordinary Gazette Notifications which include regulations pertaining to Imports and Exports control.
- ii. Issuing operational guidelines to Sri Lanka Customs, licensed banks and other relevant authorities regarding Imports and Exports control.
- iii. Issuing internal circulars pertaining to regulations issued on Imports and Exports Control.
- iv. Issuing licenses for the benefit of the local economy subject to Imports and Exports control regulations.
- v. Issuing Debit Notes after importation of items subject to License Control.
- vi. Imposing additional charges on importers who violate import and export control regulations or license conditions.
- vii. Coordinate with relevant government agencies on the development of a strategic trade management system and a method of issuing standardized import and export control licensing system.
- viii. Facilitating the implementation of recommendations of the World Trade Organization to promote local and foreign trade.
- ix. Working together with the Ministry of Environment to adhere to international conventions such as Basel Convention, Montreal Convention etc.
- x. Regulate and Publication of payment terms applicable to international commercial transactions.
- xi. Providing necessary assistance / instructions to the Director-General of Customs in the case of any issues arising in relation to the Imports and Exports Control Regulations.
- xii. Conducting training programs to develop capability, competence and productivity of departmental staff and employee welfare.
- xiii. Collection of relevant government fees and crediting them to Consolidated Fund.

1.4 Organizational Structure and Chart

The Controller General of Imports and Exports is the head of the Department of Import and Export Control under the Ministry of Finance, Economic Stabilization and National Policy.

In order to regulate the affairs of the entire import and export control sector including the imposition of laws, regulations and issuance of import control licenses under the Import and Export Control Act No. 1 of 1969, this department is implemented with the following divisions and units.

Chapter 2 - Performance and progress of the department

2.1 Policy Directives related to Regulation of Import and Export of Goods

The financial crisis that accompanied the global epidemic of Covid-19 has continued in 2021 and 2022, and hence, Sri Lanka's economy suffered a rapid decline. Especially as a result of that, the continuous depreciation of the Sri Lankan rupee relative to the US dollar was also shown. Alleviating this economic crisis situation, the important steps needed to face it were identified in the years 2021, 2022 and 2023. Here, through the regulations published by the Department of Import and Export Control, the import of non-essential goods into Sri Lanka has been temporarily suspended, especially in the years 2020, 2021, and 2022, and payment of bills for imports through Open Accounts have been completely prohibited by the Payment Term Regulations, and the importers who are re-exporters and local industrialists were exempted from the restriction. However, due to the various economic management strategies adopted by the government, the Sri Lankan Rupee has begun to gradually recover against the US dollar, and a positive economic start was reflected, as the country's inflation rate gradually decreased, the pressure on the balance of payments decreased, and investment in capital goods grew steadily, from the year 2023. Accordingly, in the year 2023, basic steps were taken to relax the import control restrictions that had been imposed until then.

There, in the year 2023, the temporary suspension of import on other imported goods, except vehicles, was completely removed through Extraordinary Gazette Notifications issued in accordance with the provisions of the Import and Export Control Act, considering the increase in the exchange reserve of the Central Bank of Sri Lanka and the ability of the commercial banks to pay for those imports due to the release of the required amount of American dollars for the authorized commercial banks.

In accordance with the Gazette No. 2312/75 dated 01.01.2023, which was jointly published by Sri Lanka Customs and the Department of Trade and Investment Policy at the beginning of 2023, this Department was published Extraordinary Gazette Notifications on January 01, 2023, which includes the new Harmonized System Codes relevant to the goods subject to import control. 1051 goods (HS Code) which are subject to import license, 49 goods (HS Codes) which are completely Banned for import into Sri Lanka, 504 goods (HS Codes) where the issuance of Import license has suspended until further notice, and 1218 goods (HS Codes) which are temporarily suspended until further notice, were published in the said Gazette Notifications.

Gazette Extraordinary No. 2312/77 -01.01.2023

The Seventh edition of the Harmonized System (HS) nomenclature i.e HS 2022 has been introduced by the World Customs Organization (WCO) in 2022, with major features of adaption to current trade through the recognition of new product streams and addressing environmental and social issues of global concern, and the new Revenue Protection Order (RPO) was updated accordingly. Gazette Extraordinary No. 2312/78 -01.01.2023

The Seventh edition of the Harmonized System (HS) nomenclature i.e HS 2022 has been introduced by the World Customs Organization (WCO) in 2022, with major features of adaption to current trade through the recognition of new product streams and addressing environmental and social issues of global concern, and the new Revenue Protection Order (RPO) was updated accordingly. Subsequently, the Control Lists (Temporary Suspension of Import) published under the Import and Export (Control) Act No. 1 of 1969, were updated and consolidated.

Gazette Extraordinary No. 2315/46 – 19.01.2023

The period allowed for import of wheat flour under Open Account / Consignment Account was extended until January 31, 2023, as per the approval of Cabinet of Ministers granted on January 10, 2023, for the Cabinet Memorandum No. 23/0006/627/001 dated December 30, 2022 of the Minister of Trade, Commerce and Food Security requesting to permit the importation of wheat flour under the Open Account payment term until January 31, 2023, in order to maintain the price of wheat flour in the domestic market.

Gazette Extraordinary No. 2320/46 - 22.02.2023

According to the Imports Control Regulations on Payment Terms No. 07 of 2022, as amended, use of Open Account Payment term has been limited to direct / indirect Exporters, local manufactures and Government Institutions including Development Projects. However, considering the difficulties faced by the Terminal Operators, who are earning foreign exchange by supplying terminal services to the exporters, importers and shipping lines, in importation of spare parts, equipment and machineries, etc. required for repairs, maintenance, upgrade of the terminal facilities, import such goods under the Open Account Payment term and settle the bills by using their forex earnings has been allowed on the recommendation of the Secretary, Ministry of Ports, Shipping and Aviation.

Further, recommending responsibility vested in the Secretary to the Treasury on importation of project goods for the purpose of Government approved projects / development projects under Open Account Payment term has been delegated for the subjects of Power, Water, Highways and Irrigation to the Secretaries to the respective Ministries of said subjects, with a view to expedite approval process and avoid unproductive steps.

Gazette Extraordinary No. 2320/47 - 22.02.2023

Even though the importation of Cosmetics has been Temporary Suspended (TS), the importation of cosmetics (15 HS Codes) was allowed subject to recommendation of the National Medicines Regulatory Authority (NMRA) and Sri Lanka Tourism Development Authority (SLTDA), at the request of those involved in the industry. However, considering the limitations faced by both NMRA and SLTDA on issuing recommendations and further requests of Cosmetic and Personal Care Associations, importation of cosmetics has been allowed limited to 50% of the five-year average value (CIF) of such items, per year.

Gazette Extraordinary No. 2324/45 -24.03.2023

In terms of the Imports and Exports (Control) Regulation No. 01 of 2019, published in the Gazette Extraordinary No. 2107/45 dated January 25, 2019, all motor vehicles classifiable under HS chapter 87 (including Quadricycles) shall comply with the Vehicular Exhaust Emission Standards and safety measures/ Standards, as specified in the said Regulation. However, the Minister of Industries has obtained the approval of Cabinet of Ministers to the proposals set out in the Note to the Cabinet No. 22/1653/617/013 dated October 10, 2022, titled “Providing excise duty concession under the HS Code 8703.21.63 and 8703.21.72 for locally built Quadricycles without consideration of Anti-Lock Braking System (ABS)”. Accordingly, a Three-year (03) grace period has been allowed for manufacturing/assembling Quadricycles in the Manufacture In-Bond Facility of the Sri Lanka Customs, without Anti-Lock Braking System (ABS). Further, Harmonized System Codes (HS Codes) relevant to motor vehicles published in the Gazette Extraordinary No. 2107/45 dated January 25, 2019, have also been updated in line with the amendments made to the Harmonized System codes (HS Codes – 2022 Edition) by Revenue Protection Order (RPO)

published in the Gazette Extraordinary No. 2312/75 dated January 01, 2023, which was jointly published by Sri Lanka Customs and the Department of Trade and Investment Policy.

Gazette Extraordinary No. 2326/40 – 06.04.2023

Exemption from endorsement requirement, as specified in the Regulation No. 6 of the Imports Control Regulations on Payment Terms No. 07 of 2022, granted for the importation of Milk Powder and Red Lentils under the Documents against Payment (DP) and Documents against Acceptance (DA) terms, until January 19, 2023, in terms of the approval granted by the Cabinet of Ministers to the proposals set out in the Cabinet Memorandum No. 22/1260/627/007 dated August 19, 2022, submitted by the Ministry of Trade, Commerce and Food Security, has been removed by the Imports Control Regulations on Payment Terms No. 03 of 2023, published in the Gazette Extraordinary No. 2315/46 dated January 19, 2023. However, exemption from endorsement requirement has been re-enforced on the representation made by importers of essential food commodities to the Ministry of Trade, Commerce and Food Security to continue the aforesaid exemption in order to ensure an uninterrupted supply of Milk Powder and Red Lentils in the domestic market.

Gazette Extraordinary No. 2326/41 -06.04.2023

The Imports and Exports (Control) Regulations No. 08 of 2023 has been published to ban the importation of Single-use plastic drinking straws, stirrers, plates, cups (other than yogurt cups), spoons including yogurt spoons, forks, knives, Plastic garlands and Plastic string hopper trays, with effect from June 01, 2023, as per the approval of the Cabinet of Ministers granted on January 13, 2023, to the proposals set out in the Note to the Cabinet No. 23/0265/622/003 dated January 31, 2023, titled “Control of Single-Use Plastic/Polythene Waste”, of the Ministry of Environment

Gazette Extraordinary No. 2335/26 -09.06.2023

In the setting of economic recovery and adjustment program supported by an Extended Fund Facility Arrangement of the IMF, attention of the relevant stakeholders including public and private entities was drawn on continuation of the prevailing Temporary Suspension of importation of goods under the Imports and Exports (Control) Regulations No. 02 of 2023, published in the Gazette Extraordinary No. 2312/78 dated January 01, 2023. Accordingly, possibility of relaxing / removing goods from the existing schedule of temporary suspension regulations was discussed at the meetings held on April 06, 2023, and May 19, 2023, at the Department of Trade and Investment Policies with the participation of officials of the Ministry of Industries, Central Bank of Sri Lanka (CBSL) and Department of Imports and Exports Control. Further, the Governor of the CBSL informed the Secretary to the Treasury to consider the relaxation of restrictions / temporary suspension of importation of goods in a phased-out manner, prioritizing them based on the importance to growth support and possible Balance of Payment (BOP) pressure. In this context, total of 286 HS Codes were removed from list of 1,216 HS Codes in the schedule of temporary suspension based on stakeholders’ requests, the size of the annual import bill and the requirement of replacement.

Gazette Extraordinary No. 2336/45 -14.06.2023

Having considered the appreciation of Rupee and its impact on the wheat flour price in the domestic market, meetings were held at the Presidential Secretariat on May 31, 2023, and June 06, 2023 with the participation of the Senior Economic Advisor to the President, officials and local manufacturers of wheat flour to examine possibility to trickle down the benefits of appreciation of Rupee to the consumers, and it has been decided at the meeting held on June 06, 2023, to impose

restrictions under the Imports and Exports Control Act, No. 1 of 1969 to control the direct import of wheat flour in the short term (for a period of two to three months) to eliminate the market imbalance and replace the import licensing for importation of wheat flour by the appropriate rate of Special Commodity Levy on importation of wheat flour. Accordingly, the import of wheat flour was subjected to License control.

Gazette Extraordinary No. 2341/38 - 20.07.2023

As per the policy discussions together with the advice of the Central Bank of Sri Lanka, it has been decided to gradually relax import restrictions (Temporary Suspensions, imposed by the Imports and Exports (Control) Regulations No. 02 of 2023, published in the Gazette Extraordinary No. 2312/78 dated January 01, 2023) prioritizing them based on the importance to trade activity support and possible Balance of Payment (BOP) pressures, whereas import restrictions on passenger motor vehicles and some selected goods to be continued until BOP pressure subside notably. In this context, a list of 327 HS Codes, identified in consultation with the Ministry of Industries, the technical team of the International Monetary Fund, were removed from the schedule of temporary suspension.

Also, for the purpose of providing services to passengers of international airlines, registered catering service providers have been allowed to import single-use plastic utensils such as cutlery and knives, which were previously banned by the Import and Export (Control) Regulations No. 08 of 2023.

Gazette Extraordinary No. 2345/03 – 14.08.2023

Importation of certain goods including motor vehicles has been temporarily suspended since 2020, as part of government policy measures aimed at easing growing pressure on the exchange rate and the financial market due to the COVID-19 pandemic situation. Having considered the improving economic situation, policy reviews along with advice from the Central Bank of Sri Lanka, import restrictions on importation are being gradually relaxed, giving priority to goods required for facilitation of growth supported activities while minimizing the pressure on Balance of Payment (BOP).

In this context, the Presidential Secretariat has requested the Ministry of Finance, Economic Stabilization and National Policies and the Central Bank of Sri Lanka to explore possibility of allowing importation of buses for the purpose of tourist transportation. Accordingly, commercial purposes vehicles (buses, lorries, trucks, tankers, bowsers and special purpose lorries), classified under 25 HS Codes, based on the observation of the Central Bank of Sri Lanka have been removed from the Schedule of Temporary Suspension.

However, this Gazette was canceled within one month from the date of publication of the gazette as per Section 20 of the Import and Export Control Act No. 1 of 1969, due to failure to meet the legal requirement under said section, since the Gazette was not approved by the Cabinet of Ministers.

Gazette Extraordinary No. 2347/08 – 29.08.2023

In a discussion held at the Ministry of Finance, Economic Stabilization and National Policy, taking into consideration the comments of the Public Finance Committee regarding the removal of the import license limit imposed on the import of wheat flour, it has been decided to revise the Customs Import Duty waiver on importation of wheat grain and Customs Import Duty on importation of wheat flour, subject to the removal of Import Control License on importation of wheat flour.

Accordingly, the Import and Export (Control) Regulations No. 10 of 2023, published in the Gazette No. 2336/45 dated June 14, 2023 has been rescinded to exempt the requirement of import control license for wheat flour.

Gazette Extraordinary No. 2353/16 – 09.10.2023

Removal of the remaining 299 HS codes (excluding motor vehicles) from the schedule of temporary suspension of imports was done under the third phase of relaxing Import restrictions imposed on the import of goods under temporary suspension as specified in the Import and Export (Control) Regulations No. 02 of 2023, published in Gazette Notification No. 2312/78 dated January 01, 2023, based on the importance to activity support and possible Balance of Payment (BOP) pressures, and selected agriculture products (25 HS Codes), which are produced locally were subjected to Import Control License until a tariff review is completed.

2.1.2 Issuance of Operating Instructions and Internal Circulars

Awareness of Sri Lanka Customs, all Commercial Banks and Departmental Officers regarding the regulations of the Gazette Notifications issued by the Department during the year is very important.

Hence, it is a primary responsibility of the department to issue operational instructions and issue internal circulars for the information of the concerned parties whenever a Gazette is published. Accordingly, the Department has taken steps to issue 10 Operating Instructions and 19 Internal Circulars in 2023.

2.2 Issuance of Imports and Exports Control Licenses

As an institution that regulates import and export activities, the main function of this Department is to issue licenses for items subject to import and export control license. Accordingly, licenses are issued under 5 units established in this Department in order to provide quality service to the clients by carrying out that function in a systematic and effective manner.

Accordingly, the information related to the licenses issued by each unit in the year 2023 is as follows.

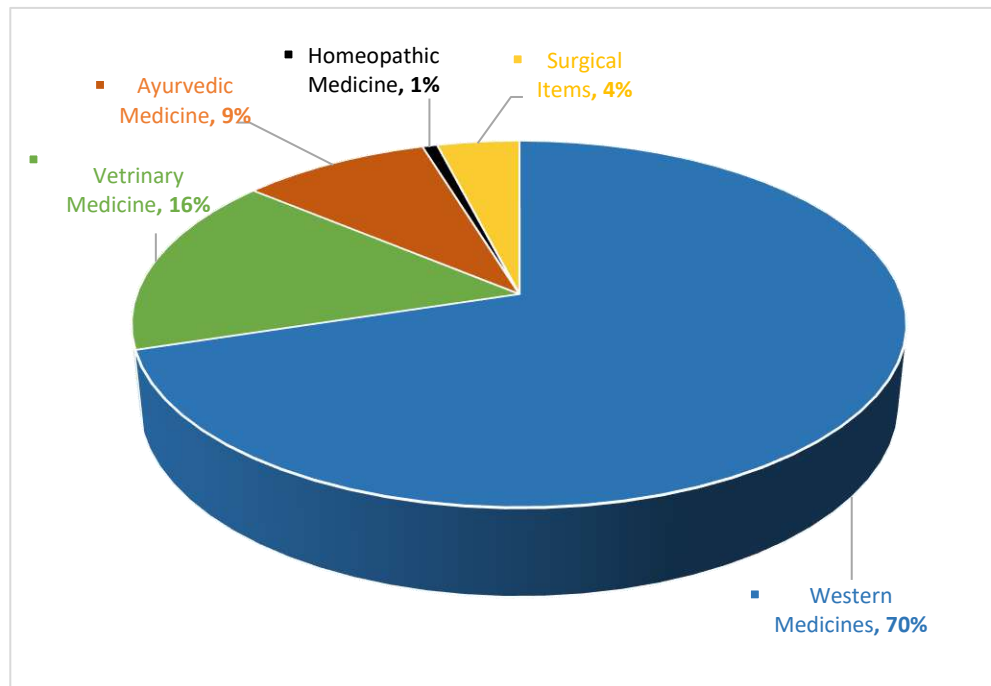
2.2.1. Unit 01- Pharmaceuticals and Surgical Items

This unit has identified some safety measures to be taken prior to the issuance of import licenses for medicines and medical devices under the approval given by the National Medicine Regulatory Authority in accordance with Section 109 of the National Medicine Regulatory Authority Act, No. 05 of 2015, and special conditions to be included in the import licenses. Further, a follow-up was done on the utilization of Bulk Import Licenses obtained in relation to the year 2023, and the conditions related to licenses were reviewed and prepared.

Number of licenses issued for Pharmaceuticals and Surgical Items

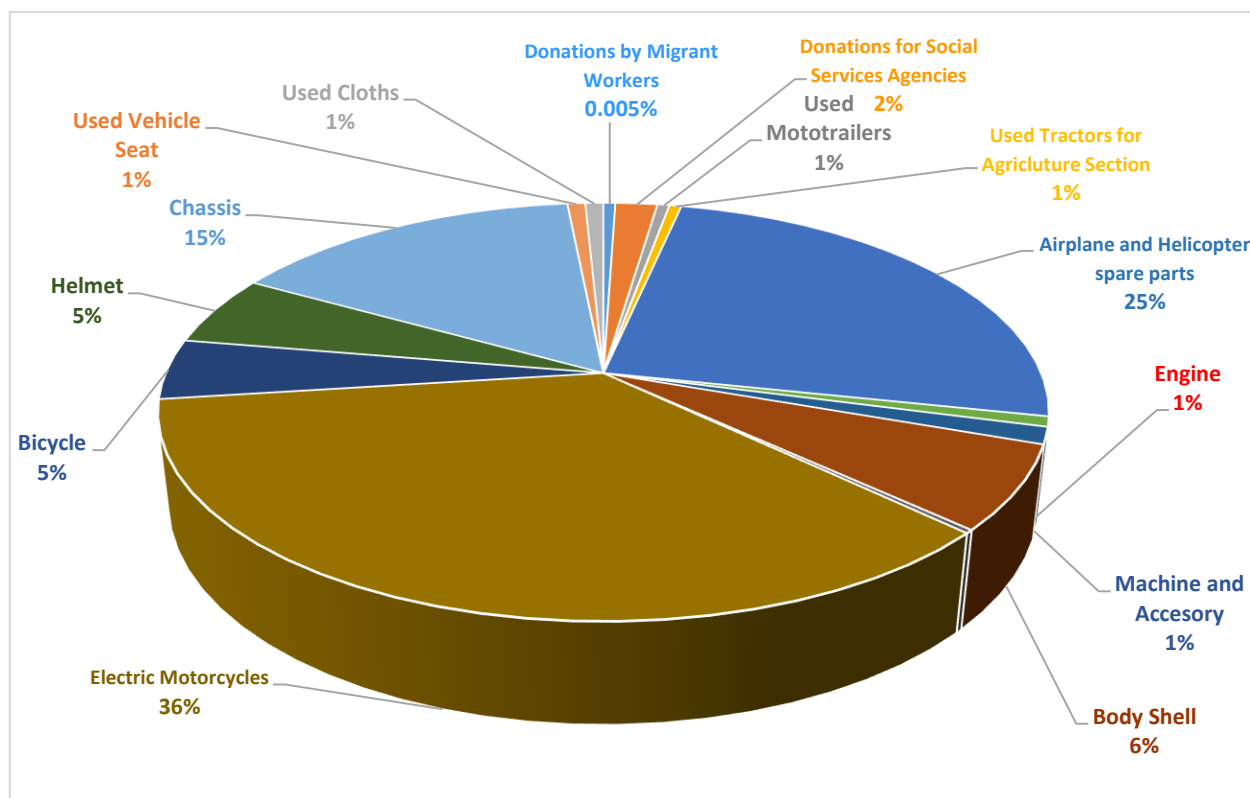

Number of licenses issued for Used Vehicles and Auto Parts

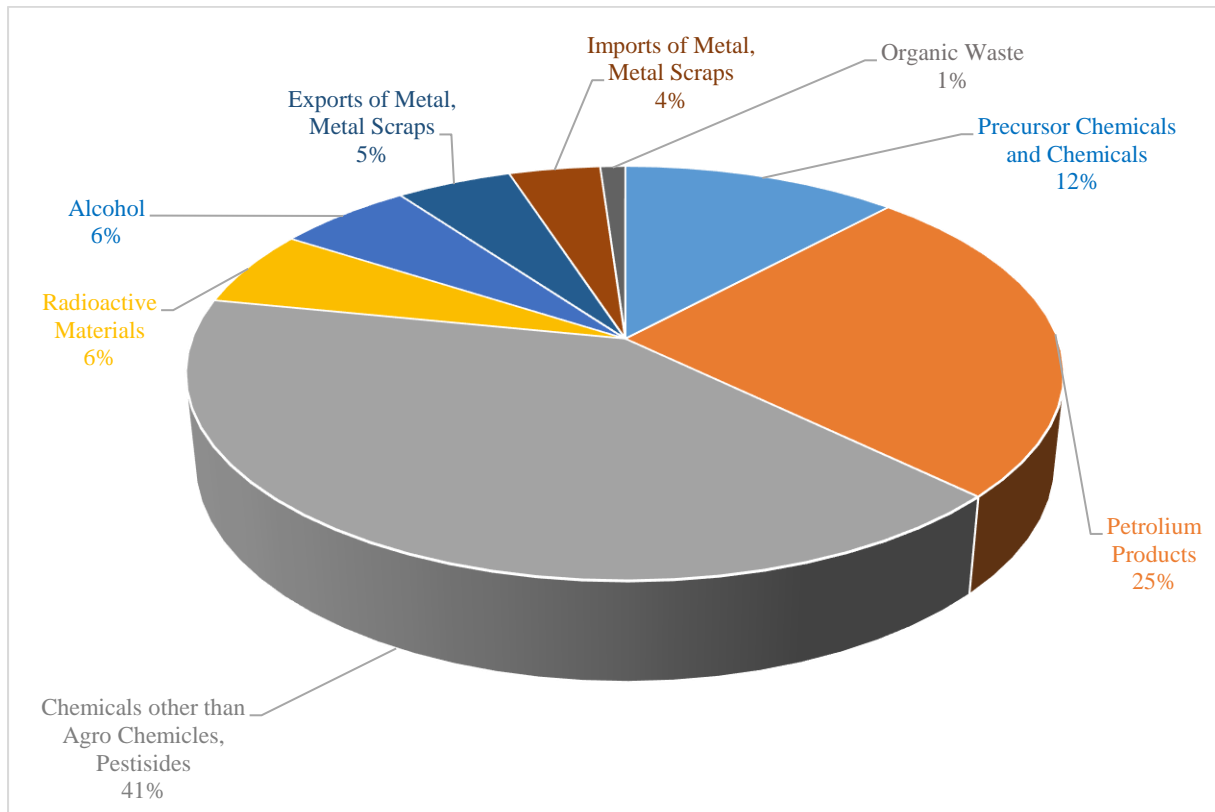

Number of licenses issued for Chemicals, Fertilizers, Pesticides and Industrial Raw Materials



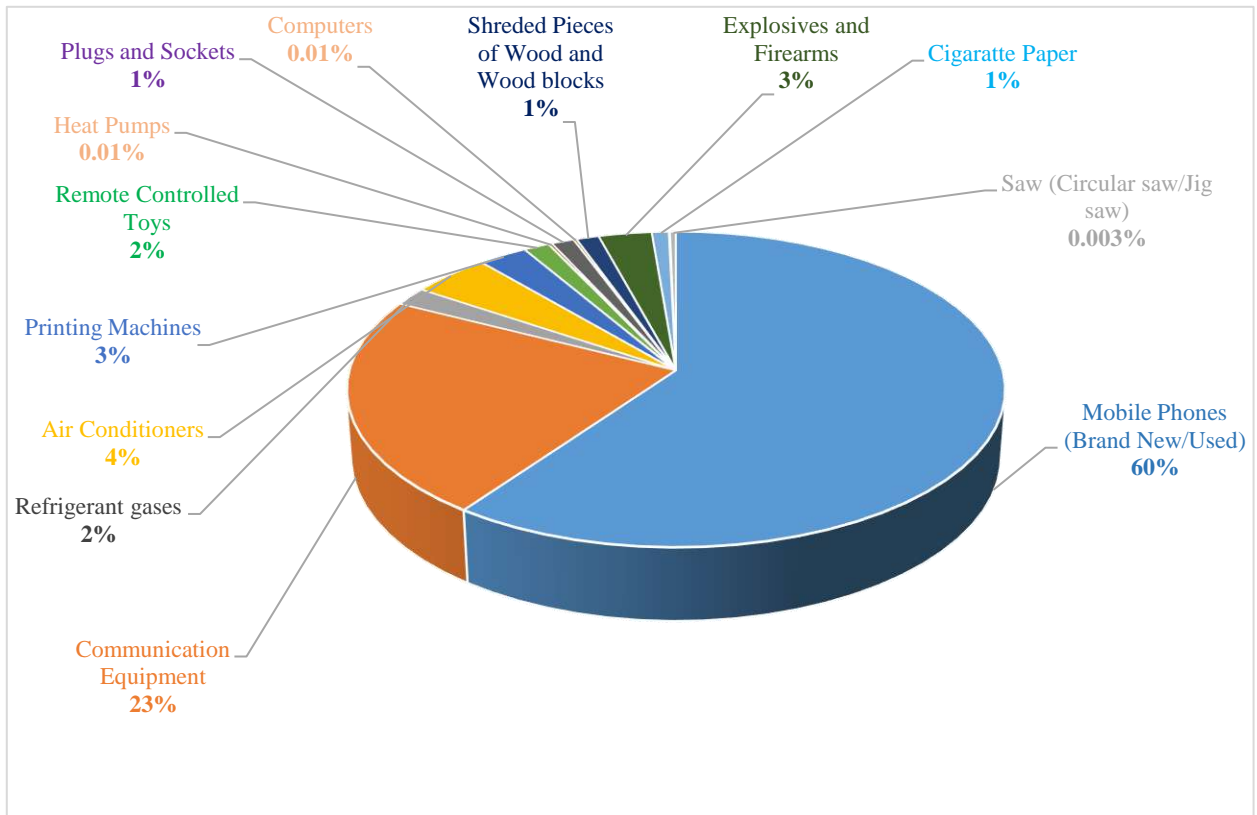

Number of licenses issued for Mobile Phones, Communication Equipment and other Imports, and Exports

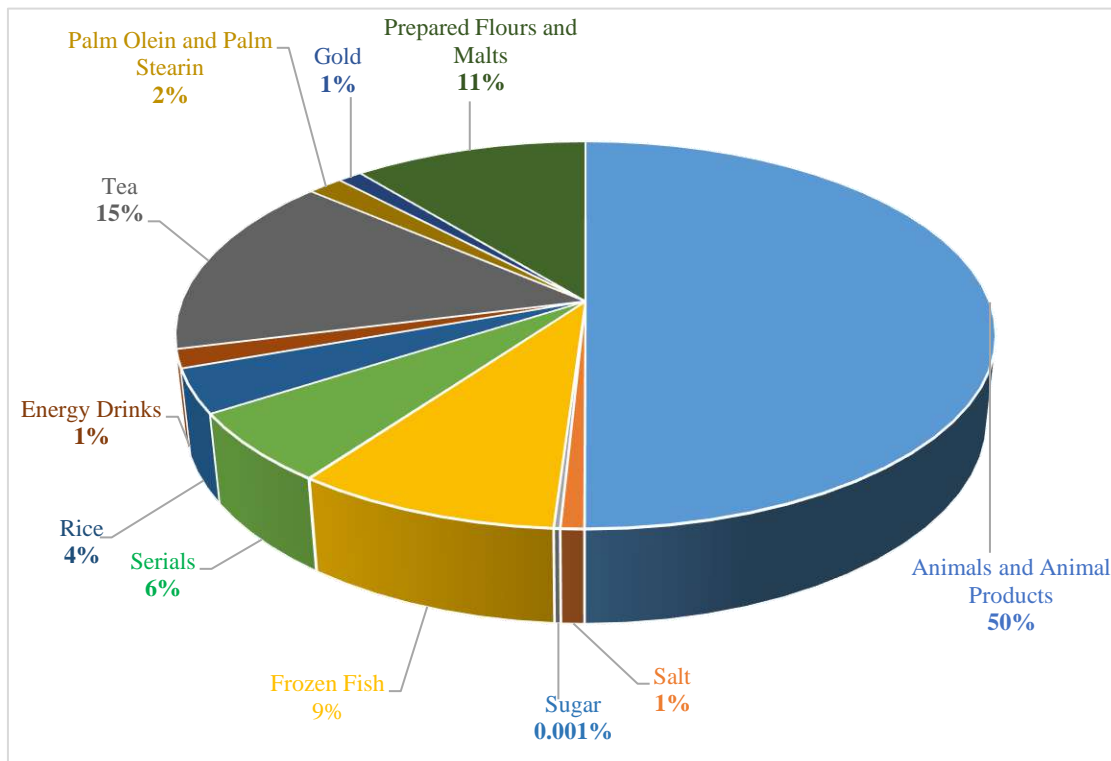

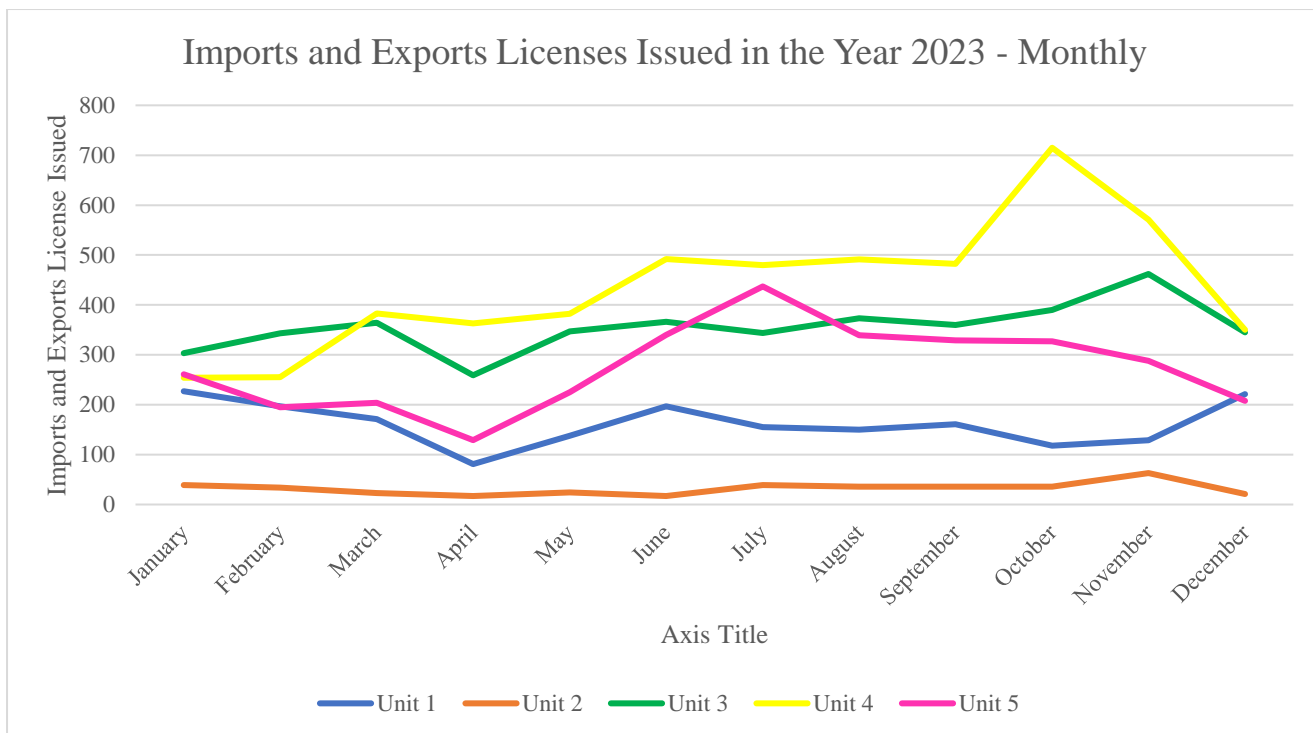

Number of licenses issued for Animals, Animal Products and Various Imports



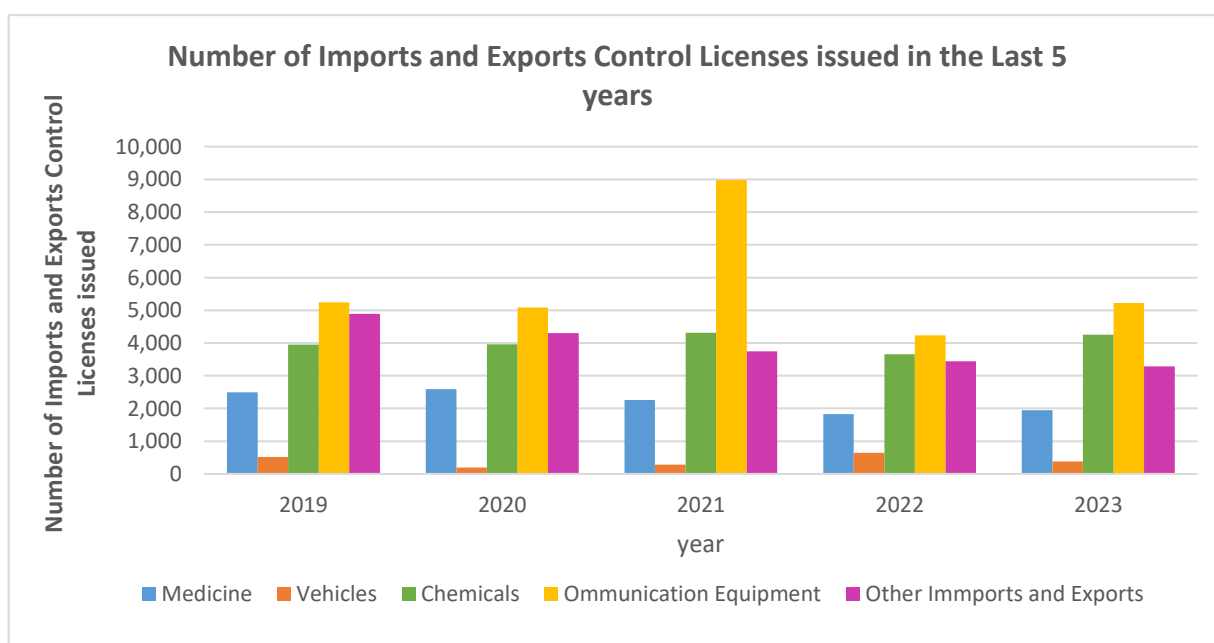

2.3 Data review of Import and Export Control Licenses Issued during the last 3 Years

2.3.1 Unit 1 - Pharmaceuticals and Surgical Items

The issuance of new licenses has slightly increased by 6.2% in 2023 compared to 2022 due to increased financial liquidity and the continued strengthening of the exchange rate. Apart from the Ayurvedic medicine category, there is an increasing trend in the number of licenses issued for all the other categories of Western Medicines, Veterinary Medicines, Homeopathic Medicines and Medical Devices.

Although, the number of new licenses issued in 2022 fell compared to 2021, it appears to be normalizing with an upward trend from 2023 onwards. Overall, it seems that the relaxation of various control conditions imposed on imports and the growth of foreign reserves have encouraged pharmaceutical companies to meet the country's pharmaceutical needs without shortages.

2.3.2 Unit 2 - Used vehicles and Auto Parts

In the year 2020, the Department was published regulations to temporarily suspend the import of vehicles and spare parts in order to reduce the pressure on the exchange rate in the face of the Covid-19 global pandemic and to raise local industries. As a result, there has been a significant decrease in the number of licenses issued for the import of vehicles by this unit, compared to the situation before the year 2020. According to the policy decisions taken by the government, licenses has been issued to import auto spare parts for the upliftment of local vehicle assembly industries locally, in the year 2021. As a result, issuance of licenses for the import of auto parts has grown steadily from 2021 to 2023.

Total number of licenses issued from Unit 2 in the year 2022 has increased with the issuance of licenses for items such as glassware, furniture, candles, sanitary ware, sunglasses, watches, and musical instruments in the said year by subjecting such items under license control by Gazette Extraordinary No. 2270/18 dated March 09, 2022, and Gazette Extraordinary No. 2274/42 dated April 09, 2022. Subsequently, these items were removed from license control by Gazette Extraordinary No. 2282/21 dated May 31, 2022.

Furthermore, although the migrant workers were more likely to import electric motorcycles and bicycles by subjecting those items under licensing control by the Gazette Extraordinary No. 2294/29 dated August 23, 2022, in that year, there is a rapid decline in obtaining licenses to import those items by migrant workers in the year 2023.

Accordingly, the total licenses issued by this unit show a gradual growth after the year 2020 and a slight decline compared to the year 2023.

2.3.3 Unit 3 – Import of Chemicals, Fertilizers, Pesticides and Industrial Raw Materials, and Exports

Issuance of licenses for the import of precursor chemicals, petroleum related products, radioactive materials, alcohol related raw materials, chemicals required for other industries, and other raw materials and for the export of scrap metal is done by Unit 3

Accordingly, number of import and export licenses issued under all categories in the year 2023 has increased compared to the last three years. As the pressure on the exchange rate due to the Covid pandemic in 2020 has gradually subsided, the manufacturing industries have gradually returned to their normal rhythm. Therefore, imports have gradually increased compared to the last three years. Also, due to the increase in production activities, the amount of scrap metal generated by it has also been exported more.

2.3.4 Unit 4 - Mobile Phones, Communication Equipment and other

Issuing Import Control License for items such as mobile phones, communication equipment, electronic equipment, wood, saws and remote-controlled toys is done by this unit.

Further, with the issuance of the Gazette Extraordinary No. 2335/26 dated June 09, 2023, the unit was assigned the task of collecting additional fees in relation to the applications referred by the Sri Lanka Customs on the violation of Open Account, Consignment Account, Documents against Acceptance and Documents against Payment terms. Accordingly, 126 applications were approved in the year 2023.

2.3.5 Unit 5 – Other Imports

Compared to the year 2022, the total number of licenses issued in the year 2023 shows a higher value and when considering categories, although the issuance of licenses for certain categories shows a higher value, the number of licenses issued for certain categories is lower compared to the year 2022.

With the subjection of rice under import license control by the Gazette Extraordinary No. 2309/40 dated December 09, 2022, 86 import control licenses were issued as of 31.12.2022, for the customs clearance of the rice consignments which has allowed to be imported as per the provisions of the said gazette and licenses have also been issued in the year 2023 as per the said Gazette.

The issuance of licenses for import of cashews, black gram flour and groundnuts which had been temporarily suspended, has started since those items were brought under license control by the Gazette Extraordinary No. 2553/16 dated October 09, 2023. Therefore, the number of licenses issued under category 570 shows an increase compared to the year 2022.

Wheat flour has been subjected to import control by the Gazette Extraordinary No. 2336/45 dated June 14, 2023, and accordingly 358 import control licenses for wheat flour have been issued for the year 2023.

The import of frozen squid under category 556 has decreased sequentially in previous years, and no import was made in the year 2023, as an artificial substitute for squid which is used as bait in the fishing industry has become popular.

Due to the removal of several non-essential goods classified under 14 categories, which have been subjected to import control licenses via the Gazette Extraordinary No. 2274/42 dated April 09, 2022, by the Gazette Extraordinary No. 2282/21 dated May 31, 2022, no Import licenses have been issued for any of these categories in the year 2023.

It is observed that the increase in the country's foreign exchange compared to previous years has led to an increase in imports under certain categories.

2.4 Payment Terms of Imports and Exports and Orders

The Department also regulates international trade transactions carried out for commercial purposes. For that, foreign trade payment terms have been published by the Gazette Extraordinary No. 1739/03 dated January 01, 2012, and the payment terms are mentioned below. Further, Operational instructions are regularly issued to commercial banks regarding these payment terms.

1. Advanced Payments
2. Documents against Acceptance - DA
3. Letters of Credit - LC
4. Documents against Payment

5. Open Accounts - OA

6. Consignment Accounts Basis

In cases where the goods have not been imported or payment has not been made to comply with the regulations related to the above-mentioned payment methods, approval is given by the Import and Export Control Department before releasing the goods from Sri Lanka Customs and making payments related to the import. Accordingly, the approvals given in the year 2023 are as follows.

2.5 Regulation and Facilitation of Imports and Exports in Sri Lanka

2.5.1 Import (Standardization and Quality Control) Regulations

Standardization and Quality Control Regulations are issued from time to time mandating and updating imported goods to comply with Sri Lankan standards in order to enable the consumers of the country to use high standard and high-quality imported goods. Accordingly, the Department has identified the necessity to amend the Standardization and Quality Control Regulations published in the Gazette Extraordinary No. 2064/34 dated March 29, 2018, which is currently in force and the relevant measures were entered into in the year 2023.

Thus, views and suggestions of the relevant parties was obtained to identify new imported items that have to be complied with the standardization and quality control. Accordingly, after discussions with various Government Institutions, Chambers of Commerce and commercial banks on the possibility of including all the proposals in the Gazette Notification, the drafting of the Gazette Notification was completed in 2023 and scheduled to be published in 2024.

2.5.2 Implementation of UN Security Council Resolution 1540 in Sri Lanka

As the proliferation of nuclear, chemical and biological weapons and their means of targeting threaten international peace, support to non-state actors in the acquisition, possession and delivery, transportation and use of such weapons must be prevented. The implementation of UN Security Council Resolution 1540 requires the export, re-export, transit and trans-shipment of nuclear, chemical and biological weapons related materials for peaceful purposes, according to the relevant laws. It is shown that since there is not enough legislation to fulfill those things, Sri Lanka should prepare a well-planned legal framework regarding the export of these strategic goods. Through the implementation of an international agreement, responsibility and accountability will be demonstrated in our country and will be gained many benefits to Sri Lanka.

In accordance with the above requirements, the Cabinet of Ministers has granted approval on September 11, 2019 for the implementation of 1540 Resolution in Sri Lanka. Also, for the effective implementation of the proposal and to provide the necessary legal and technical support intervention, two committees made up of government institutions as the Legislation Committee and the Technical Committee have been appointed with the approval of the Cabinet of Ministers. The technical committee has prepared the EU Military list and the EU Dual-Use Control List in English, Sinhala and Tamil languages.

However, the Legal Draftsman has commented on 08.03.2023 that it is appropriate to obtain the approval of the present Cabinet of Ministers for this as the approval of Cabinet of Ministers granted for this is in 2019 and it is an outdated decision. Accordingly, the new Cabinet Memorandum prepared was submitted for the approval of Cabinet of ministers.

Furthermore, the Strategic Trade Management Act has been drafted to make arrangements in order to implement the said proposal. Here, the bill prepared as per the observations of the subject experts dealing with United Nations Resolution 1540 and the legislative committee appointed for the most effective implementation of Resolution 1540 in Sri Lanka, as well as by studying the strategic trade management laws currently in force in the countries of the Asia Pacific region, was referred to the Legal Draftsman. further action is to be taken based on the observations of the Legal Draftsman.

2.5.3 Pre-Shipment Inspection Certificate

The Gazette Extraordinary No. 1804/17 dated April 04, 2013, has been published including the authorized inspection agencies from which the pre-shipment test certificate should be obtained, since it is necessary to check whether the used vehicles imported into Sri Lanka comply with the prescribed emission standards and safety measurement standards.

Taking into account the difficulties in service provided due to the monopoly that has accumulated on the basis that pre-shipment inspection certificate should be obtained only from the inspection bodies published by the said Gazette, the need to increase the number of authorized inspection agencies has arisen with the aim of providing more efficient and quality service to their clients. Accordingly, the department has made necessary arrangements to carry out the said work through a technical evaluation committee.

At present, the gazette notification required to increase the number of authorized testing institutes has been drafted and further work is being done in coordination with the Sri Lanka Accreditation Board to obtain information regarding several authorized testing institutes.

Accordingly, through the publication of this gazette notification, the importers will be able to reduce the difficulties they will face in importing vehicles and ensure the safety of the customers who buy them.

2.5.4 Gazette Notification to Publish List of Importers who Violate the Import Control Regulations (Blacklist)

Publication of the list of importers who make imports that do not comply with the standards prescribed by the import and export control regulations is an effort to fulfill the social responsibility of ensuring the national economy, public health and safety as well as environmental safety. Therefore, provisions have been made under this to publish the list of importers whose imports do not conform to the standards prescribed by the Import and Export Control Regulations.

The regulations have been prepared in tri-languages including related procedures and submitted to the Legal Draftsman, and after making the necessary amendments, the draft with the regulations will be made public through a gazette notification soon after obtaining the observations and advice of the Attorney General.

2.5.5 Introducing a New Recommendation Format for Granting Permits for Imports and Exports (Recommending Authorities)

A new format has been introduced to make it more systematic to get the recommendations issued by various agencies for issuing import control licenses, and it has prepared including important information such as quantity, quality, information about the supplier etc of the imported goods. The model has been introduced to all license recommending agencies, and this has been prepared so that it can also be used for issuing licenses through the proposed new computer software system.

Although there is a tendency to submit letters stating that they have no objection regarding the importation of a certain product by the institution giving the relevant recommendation which is considered in the issuance of import control licenses, that procedure was changed through the new form, and getting the recommendation of that institution clearly for the import of related goods is one of the positive works launched in 2023.

Also, efforts have been made to streamline import control by imposing specific conditions in accordance with each item in the issuance of licenses. Accordingly, work was done to standardize the issuance of licenses.

2.5.6. Review and Regularization of Import and Export License Conditions

The department reviewed the conditions to be included in the import and export control license, in which the general conditions for all units, conditions applicable only to each unit and special conditions to be applied to a particular item or in a particular situation are identified under the classifications, and accordingly work is being done to formalize the license conditions applicable to all sectors.

2.5.7 Preparation of a Policy Framework for Issuance of Import and Export Licenses

This department has taken initial steps to review the current license issuing procedure within the department in order to further focus directly on the targeted objectives of the department and to allow the clients to get their services transparently. Also, all the items subject to control are classified under Banned, temporary suspended, temporary suspensions of issuance of licenses, issuance of licenses in general and it is planned to publish them through gazettes after further determining the institutions that will make relevant recommendations.

2.5.8 Organization of Internal Training Sessions to Maintain Uniformity among Units

In this department, import and export licenses are issued under 5 units, and there, the situations unique to each unit as well as the submission of applications common to all units, acceptance of applications, examination of applications, approval of applications, payment and issuance of licenses as well as license debits and the calculation of fees and additional fees can also be identified. Amongst these common units, internal knowledge sharing and knowledge imparting workshops were conducted for further awareness of unique areas to maintain uniformity.

2.5.9 Strengthening of IT Division

Aiming to make the STRATLINK system, which is expected to be established and completed in order to provide services to clients through the online system, create a position of IT controller and recruit enough qualified officers for the IT division and provide special training on IT to the selected officers.

2.5.10. Evaluation of the performance of each unit numerically according to a formal schedule through the introduced performance indicators and introducing methods to correct the deficiencies by identifying them, in order to increase the performance of the department

2.6 New Improvements

2.6.1 Service Counter and Office Facilities

A large number of clients consisting of wharf clerks and various other parties visit this Department on a daily basis to applying for licenses for items subject to import control in terms of the regulations published by the Department of Import and Export Control, as well as to debiting goods imported into Sri Lanka in relation to the licenses issued in order to release them from customs.

In the year 2023, our department has paid more attention to providing quality service to the clients who come in this way. As a result, the ground floor of the Hemas building, which the department had purchased on rental basis, was allotted for the needs of the clients. There, 05 service counters were installed under separately identified subjects so that any external party can come and perform the tasks related to them. Through this, we were able to provide our service with a higher quality and to reduce the time that the client has to wait for the service received from the department.

Further, prompt response to customer issues was handled through the officers appointed at the service Counters. It is a pleasure to be able to provide a friendly and efficient service to the public. Accordingly, the service Counter system was established only for the convenience of the service providers, and it was a great help to the units and divisions of the departments to perform their duties easily. Service Counters are still actively maintained. Further, in order to facilitate the submission of applications, sample applications prepared in tri-languages and related instruction sheets were displayed. Also, preliminary steps have been taken to prepare and display the general procedures that should be followed in relation to import when a person brings a product from a foreign country to Sri Lanka.

2.6.2 Archives

Due to the limited space in the premises of the Import and Export Control Department, the need for a formal archive for the Department had been strongly highlighted in the lack of facilities to formally store the completed files.

A large number of files related to the issuance of import or export control licenses are cumulated annually. As those files have to be kept safe as per the regulations of the Right to Information Act No. 12 of 2016, a large archive space is required.

Therefore, after purchasing the ground floor of the Hemas building for the Department on rental basis, the facilities for the new archives were prepared. For that, an officer with extensive experience in archival affairs was also appointed, and a committee including staff officers was appointed to look into all the documents to be protected and supervise the archival activities.

Accordingly, an orderly, standardized and indexed formal archive was established in the Department at the end of the year 2023.

2.7. STRATLINK computer software system to be installed in the Department of Imports and Exports Control

The STRATLINK computer software system which is to be installed in order to provide more efficient and effective services of the Import and Export Control Department to the clients has been started in the year 2023. The Export Control and Related Border Security Program (EXBS Program) operating under the United States Embassy has agreed to donate a software including necessary hardware, aimed at providing assistance to meet the requirement of United Nations Security Council Resolution No. 1540, to facilitate the implementation of the electronic license issuance system at the request made by the Department. For that, approval of the Cabinet of Ministers has granted by the the letter No. AMA/23/0077/604/004 and dated 31.01.2023, of the Secretary to the Cabinet of Ministers, to the Cabinet Memorandum containing the proposals submitted for the implementation of this computer system, by the Minister of Finance.

The Cabinet of Ministers has approved the following proposals set out in the Cabinet Memorandum No. MF/IED/17/CM/2022/233 December 31, 2022, regarding the said system.

1. Acceptance of the proposed licensing software system and hardware provided as a grant by the USA EXBS program.
2. To implement the customized STRATLINK e-licensing system proposed, in the Import and Export Control Department.
3. Budget allocation of 110 million in the year 2023 or 2024 under financial code 13 for asset accounting and inventorying.
4. To connect the recommendation authorities and stakeholders in the system through the Internet for the exchange of information and data through the system, and
5. Creation of post of Controller (ICT) open to any all-island service officer to the sanctioned cadre of the Department to strengthen the Information Technology unit.

The Department has also proposed to implement an electronic import and export control license using this system. Approval of the Sri Lanka Information and Communication Technology Agency (ICTA), the Department of External Resources (ERD) and the National Planning Department have also received for that.

The installation of the STRATLINK system has been started on April 24, 2023, and the development of the system is planned to be implemented in March 2024 by carrying out several steps.

In the process of establishing the STRATLINK system which has been started in the first month of the second quarter of 2023, the resource persons have presented its prototype version to us by

the end of the year 2023. The system designers have already been informed by the committee made up of the controllers and officers of the operational units of the department about the various incomplete parts that need to be inserted. This system needs to be improved to suit our needs and to enable users to fulfill their needs through an easy and smooth process in every way. Therefore, the composition of the staff of the IT unit of the department is also being increased and their constant attention is being directed towards this and the future work plans are being launched.

First of all, registration in this system should be done by an organization as a client of the department. Discussions have already been made by us with those institutions about the possibility of verifying the legality of a company registering in this way through the company registration department's data system, and the legality of a private importer through the personnel registration department's data system. Also, the designers have been informed to include improvements to facilitate the payment of license fees and additional fees through the government payment network (Lanka Pay (Pvt) Ltd) within the new computer system.

Also, the Sri Lanka Customs Department is an institution that have to be worked inseparably with the role of the Import and Export Control Department. The development of application program interfaces (API) is in progress related to exchange of information of STRATLINK data system with the customs department's data system as it is essential to have technical facility as applicable

Accordingly, the IT Unit is being working very efficiently in constant contact with its creators to get the STRATLINK computer software system up and running in the year 2024. The works that were carried out and are to be carried out by this unit are given below.

- ❖ An audit related to data security of the Department has been conducted by KPMG audit firm as requested by Sri Lanka CERT.
- ❖ Making relevant improvements quarterly by paying attention to the matters mentioned in the observation report said audit.
- ❖ The Estonian SPINTEK – AS company is scheduled to visit Sri Lanka in March for installation of STRATLINK system and after installing the relevant system, internal and external users are to be trained on the system operation.
- ❖ Further improvement of the STRATLINK system according to departmental requirements is to be done in association with the relevant software development institute.
- ❖ Necessary activities will be done to maintain software, hardware and networking of the department in an optimal manner.

Accordingly, it is believed that in the year 2024, the entire STRATLINK system will be able to be presented to the department's customers as an IT tool equipped with the latest facilities.

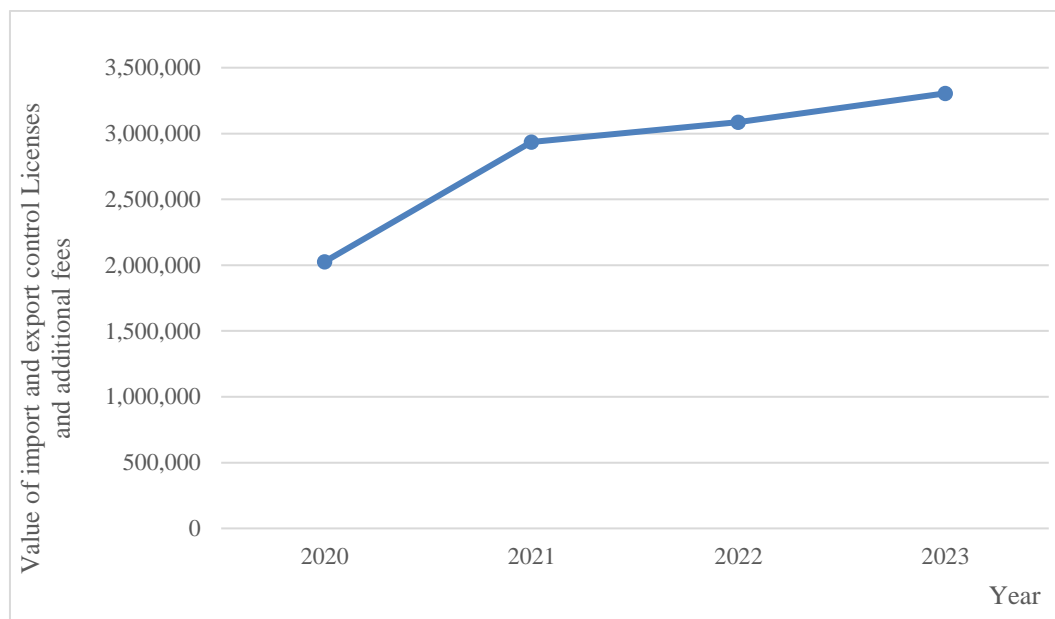

Chapter 5 - Performance of Achievement of Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

The world leaders have introduced 17 Sustainable Development Goals and 169 targets to be achieved globally by 2030, at the United Nations General Assembly in 2015. Action Plans for Humanity, Earth and Prosperity, Efforts to Strengthen Universal Peace in Comprehensive Freedom, Eradication of All Forms of Poverty including Extreme Poverty, Achieving Human Rights, Gender Equality and Empowerment of Women and Girls and Collaborative Action by All Stakeholders etc. has been included in the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development

Officials of this Department were participated in workshops sponsored by the Sustainable Development Council for the need for Sri Lankan government agencies to adapt and implement long-term development strategies as an approach to global sustainable development. Accordingly, a wider recognition of the global Sustainable Development Goals and Targets relevant to the Department has been done based on the vision, mission and role of the Department. Subsequently, the criteria for measuring the Sustainable Development Goals and its progress were established with a long-term vision to achieve the aspirations of the Department. The Department has commenced activities to meet the urgent need for sustainable development of the country through the established objectives. The Sustainable Development Goals based, on the setting of the objectives relate to the Department are as follows.

5.1 Sustainable Development Goals Identified

Make cities and human settlements inclusive, safe, resilient and sustainable. (Sustainable Development Goal 11)

In order to build a conducive environment for living in the country, air quality assurance and municipal and other waste management must be carried out. Due to the rapid increase in traffic usage in urbanized areas, the percentage of emissions from the air in those areas has also increased. It is noteworthy that the toxic fumes emitted from vehicles cause significant air pollution. Therefore, import of vehicles that do not comply with the emission standards has been stopped. For that, regulations have been imposed by the Extraordinary Gazette Notification No. 2107/45 dated 25.01.2019.

Ensure sustainable consumption and production patterns. (Sustainable Development Goal 12)

The Department act as a regulatory body to achieve the development goals envisaged by the government by minimizing adverse effects on human health and the environment through environmentally friendly management of chemicals and all wastes. Identification of such items that are affected in this way and controlling and regulating them by subjecting to import and export license, completely prohibiting import and export and prescribing standards related to import and export are properly done in coordination with other government agencies.

According to the Gazette Extraordinary No. 2326/41 and the Gazette dated 06.04.2023, the import of single-use plastic goods has been banned. Accordingly, in terms of the Approval of Cabinet of Ministers obtained by the Ministry of Environment for the proposals set out in their Note to the Cabinet No. 23/0265/622/003 dated January 31, 2023, titled “Management of Single Use Plastic/Polythene Waste”, importation of single-use plastic drinking straws, stirrers, plates, cups (except yogurt cups), spoons including yogurt spoons, forks, knives, and plastic garlands, plastic string hopper trays has been banned by the Gazette Extraordinary No. 2326/41 dated April 06, 2023.

Promote peaceful and inclusive societies for sustainable development, provide access to justice for all and build effective, accountable and inclusive institutions at all levels. (Sustainable Development Goal 16)

The Department aims to establish a decision-making process with the active participation of officers at all levels and to ensure high effectiveness by constantly evaluating those decisions. Through staff meetings and progress review meetings, officials at all levels have been actively involved in the decision-making process, enabling the establishment of an effective, accountable and transparent body.

The Department has provided the necessary facilities to those parties in a manner that fully guarantees the right of the public to access information in accordance with the national legal system and international charters and conventions. The information requested by the Department are handed over to the requesting parties in a very responsible and prompt manner and access to the updated information is also provided through the Departmental website.

Strengthen the means of implementation and revitalize the global partnership for sustainable development (Sustainable Development Goal No. 17)

The Department is responsible for implementing, facilitating, coordinating and regulating the policies taken to achieve the sustainable development goals expected by the government. Under this, the Department's objectives of ensuring the proper implementation of government policies and regulation, and enforcing and strengthening regulations relating to international trade, are unique. The sustainable development goals of improving global macroeconomic stability through policy coordination and coherence are achieved by implementing the United Nations Security Council Charter 1540 as well as the Trade Facilitation Agreement in Sri Lanka. Resolution 1540 has now been forwarded to the Cabinet of Ministers for approval, and at the same time, the Cabinet of Ministers has approved the establishment of the STRATLINK computer system in connection with the US Embassy in order to carry out issuance of Import and Export Control Licenses more effectively through the online system. Accordingly, the representatives of the Estonian government have been conducted basic level training for the officials of the Import and Export Control Department, related to the operation of the STRATLINK computer system.

5.2 Achievements and Challenges in Fulfilling Sustainable Development Goals

6.2 Impact of Shortage or Excess of Human Resources on the Performance of the Department

Requests have been made to the Secretary to the Ministry of Public Administration, Home Affairs, Provincial Councils and Local Government, Director General of Integrated Services and Secretary to the Ministry of Finance, Economic Stabilization and National Policies to take action to fill the existing vacancies in the Department. Further, the following measures were taken to fill the human resource shortage.

- Recruitment was done for the post of Assistant Director (Information and Technology).
- Arrangements were made to fill the vacant post of Administrative Officer.
- Arrangements were made to fill the vacant post of translator.
- A multi-purpose development assistant was recruited for one of the 03 vacant driver posts in the department.
- 03 multi-purpose development assistants were recruited for the 03 posts of office Assistant Service in the department, and temporary appointments were made from 01.01.2024.
